
# Summer 2015 Herron Park User Survey

While Grete Gansauer was still in "intern" mode she surveyed over 150 trail users at the Herron Park trailhead and counted over 530 users at the park. These user surveys have generated data that will be useful for the management of Herron Park in the future. Not surprisingly, hikers were tallied as the majority of trail user groups: about 52% of all users counted at Herron were hikers. Mountain bikers, horseback riders and runners followed at 24%, 14% and 10% respectively. Herron Park's trail network is, and will always remain, a multi-use system. In the survey results, 46% of users stated that they visited Herron Park 2 times per week or less, while 21% of people said that they were visiting from out of town. Clearly, locals are not the only people drawn to spending a day at Herron. FTBT is also delighted to report that over 98% of those surveyed rated their overall trail experience as a 4 or a 5 on a fivestar scale.

# Message from Clifford Kipp, Chairman

# **Greetings from Foy's to Blacktail Trails!**

Over the last few years it has been a real pleasure to reflect on the annual accomplishments our little organization has enjoyed, representing substantial gains in each of our focus areas.

Riding the momentum of having completed our capital campaign for land transfer to Herron Park in late 2014, our Board of Directors revised our Strategic Objectives early in 2015 to focus on Leadership, Partnerships, Stewardship and Outreach in the interest of achieving our mission to connect Herron Park with the USFS land around Blacktail Mountain.

Together with Flathead County we co-hosted a threemonth Conservation Intern who meaningfully advanced some of our outreach and stewardship objectives including establishing social media protocols, compiling a user survey, revising our trail map, and drafting an invasive weed management plan for Herron Park. We were also fortunate to be named a host site for a month-long intern from Patagonia, Inc. who helped significantly with our outreach objectives.

We increased the recreational amenities in Herron Park by constructing two phases of the Boundary Trail, adding over a mile of new trail to the system. We installed native plant interpretive signs along the Nature Loop, as well as park and natural history educational displays at our trailhead kiosk. Each of

# these initiatives was advanced significantly during two large volunteer service events we hosted in celebration of National Trails Day, and National Public Lands Day. Importantly, we met with key private landowners to

discuss terms and draft the easements required to eventually complete our namesake, the Foy's to Blacktail Trail. This process could be formalized and finalized as early as June. We look forward to continuing our legacy of working cordially and in good faith with land owners and land management agencies to achieve our mission.

Thanks to generous donations, a successful kick off of Foy's to Blacktail Trails Membership program, and faithful grants, we brought in \$81,087. This exceeded budget expectations. Half of the 2015 expenses went directly to trail expansion and maintenance. The \$50K that was budgeted for easements across private land between Herron Park and Blacktail wasn't spent in 2015, but these funds are available in 2016 for this monumental undertaking. The Board is working hard toward this goal and having the cash on hand puts FTBT in a great position knowing we have the financial support of FTBT's members to secure easements and maintain the trails.


#### **Memberships**
