

We are thrilled to share our 2019 accomplishments with all our members and supporters. A huge thank you to the trail volunteers that came out and rolled up their sleeves. And if you didn't make it out on a work day, be assured that your annual membership and donations are put to great use getting boots on the ground. Thank you for your continued generosity!

APRIL 2019

Second annual volunteer training with Flathead County Parks & Recreation. This helps balance knowledge (and removes some liability hurdles) when dedicated volunteers join us. If you'd like to lend a hand in 2020, please consider attending this training next spring. Safety doesn't happen by accident.

Volunteers busted out their brushes to help re-stain the picnic tables at the Foy's Community Center, horse stables area, the meadow and pavilion, and at the lookout. Gratitude goes out to Montana Academy, Herron Park Equestrians, the FTBT Trails Committee,

and the committed volunteers (you know who you are) that helped us spiffy up the park for spring.

Each April the US Forest Service offers chainsaw training for FTBT volunteers. Thanks to our USFS partner and those that received this training to keep our trails clear of downed trees. Vroom vroom!

JUNE & EARLY JULY 2019

Thanks to generous supporters like YOU and other grant funding, we hired a Montana Conservation Crew (MCC) for three weeks to assist with trail maintenance on FTBT and John Chase Forest.

Week one: MCC took on noxious plants and targeted knapweed and thistle on the Lakeside to Blacktail Trail, the Foy's to Blacktail Trail, and associated trailheads. This was a first-ever effort, but a growing need. Once noxious weeds arrive and take over it's tough to hold then line. We are happy to report very little knapweed along the trails on Forest Service land, however, large infestations were at the trailheads and the two-track road at Emmons Saddle, Foy's to Blacktail Trail, the Lakeside to Blacktail Trail and Blacktail Mountain trailhead. Please keep an eye out for these invaders to avoid transport. Check your socks, clothing, canine companions and packs for burrs or seeds. Dispose of them in the trash, please do not toss them back on the trail or into the fields. Thanks for taking aim on weeds!

Weeks two and three: A MCC Youth Expeditionary crew showcased their excellent brushing skills on two

miles of Blacktail trails. These trails had not seen much love for several years so the crew got to work widening the corridor and cutting back of overgrowth to ensure a safer path. The same crew did a little digging and touched up the tread on the seldom-used Emmons Spring Trail. They removed 50 pounds worth of nails and trash at the Emmons Saddle Trailhead and knocked out another two miles of brushing along the Foy's to Blacktail Trail. This powerhouse crew finished their time with FTBT by digging in the dirt to stabilize and level the trail tread of the Chase Trail above Herron Park (1.5 miles in total). Because it was early July, they were rewarded with spectacular fireworks from atop the ridge on John Chase's property. Mr. Chase, we think you're pretty awesome! Thank you.

JULY to OCTOBER 2019

FTBT and Weyerhaeuser coordinated a safety effort to inform trail users of a summertime logging operation near Herron Park. Thank you hikers, bikers and other folks for your wonderful compliance and big thanks to Weyerhaeuser for allowing public use on their lands. All trees were hugged before logging.

NATIONAL TRAILS DAY & PUBLIC LANDS DAY

In June and October, dedicated FTBT volunteers came out lend a hand with trail maintenance and we are proud to announce the sign installation of A Landscape Shaped by Glaciers. This educational sign is found at Foy's Overlook and offers a look at the landscape as it would have appeared 20,000 years ago. Yep, it's sweet.
