#### A SUMMER TO REMEMBER (OR TRY TO FORGET?)

Can you believe it's almost 2022? Many of us feel like we are still recovering from the epic summer of 2020.

We all experienced it: hordes of people on the trails, trailheads full of cars, and no open campsites. According to a report released in November 2021 by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, outdoor recreation accounted for 4.3% of Montana's GDP last year — a higher percentage than any other state. It seems like everyone picked Montana as their COVID getaway.

Overall, outdoor recreation and tourism fell in 2020 as consumers canceled, rescheduled or rearranged their plans. However, Montana fared pretty well as everyone flocked to enjoy our state's outdoor resources. Of course, we locals continued to explore, according to a poll conducted by the Institute for Tourism and Recreation Research. But

between locals and visitors, campsites saw so much pressure that 23% of Montanans said they could not stay at their chosen location. Most found another spot to enjoy, while about 25% simply went home to relax and avoid the crowds altogether.

The good news in 2021? Sporting events have returned. Music festivals are back on. Travel is less restricted. Trails are less crowded. The summer of 2020 won't soon be forgotten, but it sure does make us appreciate our little corner of the world. We are beyond blessed to have public lands right out our front door. These trails can't be built or maintained if we don't fund them. With the uncertain outlook of the lingering pandemic, be sure to support your local trails. You never know what you have until you share it with 12.6 million visitors.
